We must fight the good fight of faith regardless of the obstacles. "The pessimist sees a problem in every opportunity; the optimist sees an opportunity in every problem." Well, we are faced with many problems. But, let's look at it this way: "We are surrounded by insurmountable opportunities!" So, let's make whatever adjustments we need to make and in the words of General Puller say, "they'll never get away this time!"

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
